W.R. & YVONNE ROBBINS

W.R. & Yvonne Robbins established the Robbins Business & Leadership Scholarship at Dodge City Community



College in April, 2017 for students committed to continuing at the Fort Hays State University W.R. and Yvonne Robbins College of Business and Entrepreneurship.

W.R. Robbins graduated from

Dodge City Community College in 1957 and completed his education at Fort Hays State University in 1959 with a Bachelor of Science in Education. He returned to Dodge City to teach math and science before pursuing a career in the banking industry. In 1971, he purchased his first bank, Farmers State Bank, in Albert, Kansas. The bank has grown from one location with about \$4 million in assets to nine locations, 110 employees, and \$775 million in assets.

On April 27, 2017, Mr. Robbins came to the DC3 Campus and gave a presentation to students to speak about his personal path to success as well as the inner workings of the banking industry. He also announced his generous donation to the DC3 Foundation for the new Robbins Business & Leadership Scholarship. The criterion for the new scholarship is for students to have an established interest in Business, Leadership, or Entrepreneurship.

Christina Haselhorst, Foundation Director stated, "To have our DC3 Alums supporting the Foundation, both through scholarships and other donations, can be transformational. It gives the Foundation the strength to be able to provide assistance to Dodge City Community College and its students for years to come."

DC3 and FHSU Partnership for 4-year Teaching Degrees

Beginning spring semester of 2018, the Dodge City Community College Teacher Education program is partnering with Fort Hays State University in an agreement that would allow current and future Dodge City Community College Education students to obtain their Bachelor's degree in Education from Fort Hays State University while maintaining residency in the Dodge City area. The hybrid program will offer face-toface instruction as well as online learning opportunities with potential for all classes to become face-to-face in the future.

This program will be open not only to new students but to existing students as well. With teacher shortages in Kansas, this is another way for higher education to provide a smooth, convenient, and cost-effective path for the teachers of the future to realize their dreams.

"This will allow persons interested in pursuing an education degree to do so locally, thus helping to relieve the current teaching shortage we have in Southwest Kansas," said Lorna Ford, DC3 Professor of Early Childhood Education. "Where they student teach would be up to FHSU, but students are currently placed here and in surrounding communities so they should be able to be placed locally for student teaching."

When asked about scholarship opportunities, Ford replied, "The scholarships that DC3 currently offers would be available to students while enrolled with DC3. Once enrolled with FHSU, there is a scholarship call the 'InPlace Scholarship' that students would be eligible for. There are scholarships available through the Board of Regents, as well, that all education majors are eligible to apply for."

"I graduated in 1992," Ripple said. "I also spent 8 years at Garden City Community

College, first as a women's basketball coach and later in the athletic department administration. So I'm familiar with Dodge City and the Jayhawk Conference."

Ripple moves to Dodge City after a stint as athletic director at Northeast Community College in Norfolk, Nebraska. While at Northeast, Ripple added four new sports at the school, doubling the number of athletic programs from four to eight. When asked how he heard of the AD opening, Ripple stated, "I heard from several people I went to high school with. I really didn't think about the opening — and if it weren't for the student activity center I wouldn't have continued — but the college's place in the community, an on-campus facility for athletics, it was a good fit."

In a press release from DC3 marketing director Andrea Loll, the National Council in State Boards of Nursing for NCLEX exam pass rates ranked the DCCC nursing program sixth in the state and 207 in the nation. Looking to the future, the nursing program will continue to improve and provide more opportunities to connect the knowledge gained in the classroom with clinical experiences. "I do believe that all nursing programs in the state of Kansas have a genuine desire to ensure that the future of nursing is the best that it can be," Hailey said. "The networking

"There have been many changes in our department over the last 10 years," said Mechele Hailey, director of nursing and allied health in the press release. "Mary Benjamin, the previous nursing director, did an excellent job preparing us for accreditation visits in 2015 and improving the overall quality of the program. We continue to seek out opportunities for improvement to make our program the best that it can be."

Some of the improvements made to the program were changing admission requirements, providing more extensive exam preparation and focusing on helping students to improve their study skills.

The 2017 year has been a busy one for DC3 and the Board of Trustees. Although the Board has had challenges this year, they are moving towards a positive future.



This spring, Dr. Harold Nolte, President, will be meeting with the

Trustees for a strategic planning workshop where they will formulate a plan for the future of DC3 as well as prepare for the upcoming Higher Learning Commission visit in 2018.

The President is excited about renewed partnerships between DC3 and the City of Dodge City, Ford County, and the Dodge City Area Chamber of Commerce. Because of these partnerships, members of the faculty and staff were able to participate in the Lead for Change program at the Kansas Leadership Center in Wichita. DC3 has also partnered with the Dodge City Daily Globe, the Chamber, and Rocking M Media to host a Candidate Forum on October 17th for the upcoming Trustee elections to be held November 7th. The following candidates are running for the four openings: Incumbents, Morris Reeves, Merrill Conant, and Gary Harshberger. Other candidates: Kathy Ramsour, Dan Reichenborn, Mia Schraeder Korbelik, Pete Weil, and Bill Hammond.



"I do believe that all nursing programs in the state of Kansas have a genuine desire to ensure that the future of nursing is the best that it can be," Hailey said. "The networking between programs and with the Kansas Board of Nursing is very positive and supportive. Here at DCCC, we have students, staff and faculty that have demonstrated excellent ability to adapt and overcome multiple challenges. One hundred percent of our students either enter the workforce or are continuing their education at the BSN level full time after graduation."



These partnerships also allowed the Board to make informed decisions regarding the sale of college land for retail purposes. Because of these discussions, the land along 14th Avenue will not be sold. A smaller portion of unused land (3.1 acres) was sold to the City. No buildings, parking lots, or other infrastructure are affected by this sale. The college will receive property tax proceeds for 20 years as a part of the development agreement.

Our faculty are doing amazing things this year! Don Bates, DC3 Assistant Professor of English, is one of them and had a non-fiction essay accepted for publication to the scholarship journal, *34th Parallel Magazine*." The essay, "Comets," is about his attempts to view Halley's Comet in 1986. Our DC3 Building Trades Program is working hard on the home they are building through a partnership with the Community Housing Association of Dodge City and the DC3 Academic Success Center is busier than ever.

Students are excelling as well! One of them, DC3 STEM student Carmen Del Real will be presenting a poster presentation on her abstract, "A Screen for Genetic Modifiers of Protein Phosphatase 1 in Drosophila Collective Cell Migration" at the 2017 Annual Biomedical Research Conference for Minority Students November 1-4 in Phoenix, AZ.

Chinese Leadership and Culture Experience

Yaroslaski traveled to Zhengzhou China where she taught leadership classes to nearly 300 college sophomores enrolled in Fort Hays State University's dual degree program at Sias International University. Yaroslaski was granted a semester sabbatical from DC3 to pursue this unique opportunity. ng in China. Professor

Professor Yaroslaski lived on campus at Sias International University and taught five sections of Leadership Behaviors. This class was the first "western" style class for many of her students. Chinese students are much more used to lecture based classrooms. The challenge for these students was to take a class fully delivered in English and learn how to participate in an interactive classroom.

At DC3, Professor Yaroslaski offers classes that are very interactive and that keep students engaged with very little lecture. In China, this proved to be a significant challenge




for students as they were deeply concerned about having the wrong answer or embarrassing themselves. Adding to the

challenge, some students had very strong English skills While others spoke almost no English. Professor Yaroslaski speaks no Chinese. Students are warned that all content would be delivered in English, but often Professor Yaroslaski was asked to speak more slowly.

Despite the struggles of the Chinese classroom, Professor Yaroslaski says she learned much that Working with an entire classroom of second language learners, she discovered many things that can be barriers to students. Now she is more mindful of possible stumbling blocks students might face in a classroom and works to adapt material to all students. Professor Yaroslaski is also able to offer students first hand examples of cultural differences in communication and leadership. She says that students often ask questions about her students in China
